

The intent was to test the Corsair's mighty R-4360 engine mated with a turbosupercharger (coolest word ever). What do you need for a straight winged Corsair? Long landing gear to accommodate its huge prop. As this was a high-altitude test bed it featured a pressurized four place cabin in place of the fighter's single cockpit. A very interesting lineage indeed. If you squint a lot, you can just about make out the Corsair heritage.

Many will be aware that Keith Trillo suffered a Stroke some 8 to 10 weeks back. Disturbing in the extreme to see this happen to such wonderful mate.

I had a phone chat with Keith on Tuesday 23rd. He's home, has been for about 2 weeks and I am glad to say he seems to be progressing very positively. In his words on the Stroke "the Port side shut down".

Having been in hospital for probably 4 weeks, he has been sent home, not allowed crutches or a wheelchair. He has to walk, and he does.

Keith is built of "Resolve" and sounds determined to get over the bits that have gone on strike and is finding replacements within his system.

He still talks aircraft performance, Reynold numbers and model competition, in which he is deeply embedded and very skilful.

For the more recent members, who do not know him, Keith is a retired Air NZ Captain. He learned to fly in Whanganui and progressed through NAC on DC3s and Air NZ on the DC8. He is married to Carol who, he tells me, is a very competent caregiver

Among many aircraft, he had Pitts ZK-EEU and when I wanted to fly TOY North Cape to Bluff in one day, back in Feb 1990, enroute to the Mandeville fly-in, Keith offered to come with me in his Pitts. It was a success. When, off the west coast of Stewart Island in gale Westerly conditions, I suggested over the RT that I may go land on the beach. Keith's cautious council came back - "Not a good place to have a problem Don"? There were no wheel marks on the beach that day.

A little later, when we got to South Cape, the bottom of Stewart Island, Keith drawled over the RT, "any further and we're gonna be exported".

He was the stabilizing mentor I needed. It took us 25 mins to cross Foveaux Straight that day going South and just ten to get back.

Keith, always with good yarns, funny stories and interesting chats on the theories of flight, is great company.

I wish him well and look forward to his total recovery. He's worth it.

Building can be frustrating especially when you have the rudder cables back to front!

There is a fork end and a plain end and when I built the tail cone it was not very clear which way round to put them. After joining the tail cone to the cockpit, I threaded the cables through to the rudder paddles (its only at a later date that you connect them) There is plastic tube on the cable which protects the wire as it passes through the main spar tunnel. It is in an almost impossible place to get your fingers, let alone spanners. It took me the best part of a day to accomplish it. So, when I discovered I had to take the cables out and reverse them, undoing an arduous day's work- well that's a building lesson, read the bloody plans twice!




