

Thorp T18 versus Mig 21 Fighters



I noted the mention of Don Taylor's T18 displayed in the Museum at Oshkosh and reference to his round the word flight in 1976 in it.



I wondered if younger members were aware of another T18 and pilot who was also making headlines in 1976. This was Australian Clive Canning who departed Melbourne on June 12, 1976 and arrived at Shoreham London to a Popular Flying Association Fly In on July 1 after some 95 hours flight time.

Clive wrote a book on his exploit entitled Charlie Mike Charlie (the aircraft Reg).



The Chapter that I recall most is the one where the Civil Aviation Authority in Syria omitted to advise the Military that VH-CMC would be transiting their airspace.

The MiG 21's first appeared on either side of the aircraft at about half mile distance and appeared friendly enough and then disappeared only to re appear over the top of the T18 displaying the blast furnace of their exhausts. After a number of these encounters and avoiding them by being able to out manoeuvre them, two more MiG's appeared before they all moved away, little did Clive realise this was to allow their leader to shoot him down.

The noise and shock waves as the cannon shells passed the aircraft he described as beyond description.

Clive's only option was to make a bee line for Homs off to starboard of track and circle the centre of the city at low level which stopped the firing but was only a short term fix so he elected to land on a dirt track between two fields.

After a successful landing and immediate exit, he was immediately surrounded by some of the locals so was relatively safe.

Without going into further detail with the story the military were eventually convinced he posed no threat and he was told to leave NOW. Wisely he did not argue.

[Ed. I had an interesting discussion with Rob Keith about this book as I also own a copy which I purchased as a teenager at the AACA Fly-In at Te Kowhai in Feb 1980. This was my first introduction to the world of homebuilt aircraft.]

Arjen Visser – Sling TSi

The instrument panel for my Sling TSi has arrived from Blenheim. It was being delivered to Ardmore by a Sling TSi! The Sling TSi based at Fielding flown by the NZ Sling agent, flew from Fielding to Blenheim to pick up the instrument panel and all the avionics along with the owner of avionicsnz.com, Jake Bradley, and flew up to Ardmore where I picked them up and drove to my house to see how it all fits in my Sling TSi. All the looms were installed and fitted perfectly. I then drove them back to Ardmore so they can fly back to Blenheim and then to Fielding. A lot of flying done in one day.



It really is a beautiful panel and so much effort and thought has been put into this design. It is a plug and play system with so much attention paid to the little details to make it easy to install and maintain. It is a fully backlit system with a plastic overlay. The switches are installed on an aluminium plate along with the LED lights. Then a plastic panel is put on top and the light shines through the lettering that has been lasered into the plastic. So only the stalks of the switches poke through the plastic layer. You do not see the mounting screws. Very tidy and very clear. Can highly recommend Jake Bradley for his expertise and love of all things avionics.



I have mounted the canopy onto the fuselage. I am not entirely happy with the paint job I did now that it is on the fuselage, and I see it from a different angle, and will see if I can make some touch ups while it is mounted in place. There is no way it is coming off as it is riveted and bonded in place.



The back skins are also riveted and are finished. I can start to install some inside skins in place as well as some of the upholstery. Next job is to see if I can get it out of my garage. Fingers crossed!

Ardmore Operations and Radio Calls

Hi Team,

By now everyone has probably browsed through the newly designed website for Ardmore Airport company.

It has the preferred arrival animations; web cameras on the tower; and much more.

In the last Ardmore operators meeting we were all reminded that there are 2 separate calls (not one) required prior to take off:

- 1. Line up call
- 2. Rolling call including your intentions

i.e., it's not correct to say "lining up and rolling runway 21".

Be aware that as you climb out using a recommended departure procedure you may still encounter unexpected traffic so keep a good lookout.

An energetic climb to at least 1500ft will get you above most traffic and though it seems unnecessary, it often pays to make an additional position report.




